Mike started volunteering with us in early 2024 and normally drives for two half-day outings organised by Bridge College each week. With students and staff on board, Mike clocks up 50 miles on his return trips to Heyhead Farm, near Bolton, and The Toy House, a Flixton-based charity.

This is Mike's first ever volunteering experience and the driver role was "the quickest and best way for me to start work with the Together Trust."

Mike says "I had some time during the week and wanted to be useful and give something back to help the community. I also felt it would be good for me to learn new subjects and meet new people. I looked online for opportunities and liked what the Together Trust is about.

The volunteering team has been great, super welcoming and supportive. The training was great and I learnt a lot about the pupils and their environment.

On Fridays we go to a farm with educational facilities and I love how much the students get from these visits. I've really enjoyed getting to know the young people a little bit more every week."

Mike, who's recently received his 100 hours volunteering certificate, adds that he likes "helping people who need it" and gets "a real sense of achievement and wellbeing from that."

Most people enjoy taking a break, and that's especially true for Kaiden, a resident of Haines House. He starts counting down to his next holiday at Whithaugh Park as soon as his current one ends!

Thirteen-year-old Kaiden has been to this Scottish outdoor activity centre 8 times in the last 4 years. He loves his 'Holiday House' and residents from Haines visit twice a year. Their last holiday there was Easter this year.

Nestled in the Scottish borders, Whithaugh
Park offers Kaiden, and its other young visitors,
exciting activities such as canoeing, archery, gorge
walking and a zip wire run. There's also the chance
to enjoy nature and many other outdoor activities.



Kaiden says "The zip line is really fast and high up. I get excited coming down, but it is a long walk back up for another go! The boats are good, we paddle them ourselves and play games on the lake. I like to run my hand in the water as we go along."

"For Kaiden it is as much about the anticipation of doing something he really enjoys" says Kevin Clarke, Registered Manager at Haines House. "We talk about it all the time and have photographs from our trips

round the home. It is a thread that runs through the whole year."

Normally, Kaiden wears reins when out in the community as he has little awareness of danger, but at Whithaugh Park he doesn't wear them. "I can run around the site without my reins on and there are lots of streams and woods to play in. It has lots of space and places to play."

Kevin says:

"Going away and sleeping somewhere else then coming back affirms Haines as his home. Kaiden loves the whole experience, every day is a good day for him and just being able to be less restricted in his movement and routines is a big thing for him."

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Our new 'Sleep Tight' programme in Yorkshire got off to a flying start with nearly 300 referrals in the first 6 months since the service launched in October 2023.

Working in Yorkshire is a new step for us as our Together Trust care, support and education services are all based in the North West.

'Sleep Tight' helps 2-11-year-old children in the Bradford area, who have problems sleeping, by providing online and face-to-face support to their families.

"It's been tremendously busy since we started." said Therapy and Specialist Support Services

<u>Business Manager, Gina Howard</u>, who got the





service up and running. "Our commissioning partner likes our 'in person' approach, the quality of our service and our ability to access a wide range of other related services within our own charity."

"In addition to their remit, our practitioners have also picked up on and tried to resolve, with other organisations, associated issues which impact sleep such as unsuitable living circumstances and medical conditions."

Sleep Tight Bradford provides several services such as 1-2-1 sleep clinics, family workshops and sleep chat phone calls. Our practitioners also train other professionals to help families experiencing sleep difficulties. In our first half year, we've had positive results and good feedback from Sleep Tight parents.

Owen, a 21-year-old student, shows how Bridge College's work experience programme is helping change the employment prospects for people with disabilities.

The programme currently provides 50 students with placements to help them develop their confidence, learn employment skills and understand what is needed to be successful at work.

After identifying that Owen wanted to be a cashier, the college found him a once-a-week placement at the Mencap charity shop in Openshaw.



Owen says: "I love doing it.
I love working. My favourite
thing about work is serving the
customers because, as they
say, customers come first and
the customer is always right."

Owen, who's worked at the shop for 18 months, added "I needed a lot of support because it was a new job but the more I did it the more independent I can be."

Lisa Daniel, Work Experience Coordinator at Bridge College, adds "I've seen Owen really progress at the shop. He now works on the till on his own, can handle change, take card payments and log donations on the computer. His sense of humour means he's built good relationships with the regular customers. Together with a wonderful personality, Owen has both the employment and soft skills to gain full-time, paid employment."

"I've got no doubts that the students can work in most workplaces. It's a positive step towards spreading the word about disability and not making it a disadvantage, but an ability to do something." says Owen's boss, Mencap Store Manager, Sam Turner. As well as this retail experience, Owen is also using his considerable, selftaught musical talents to entertain Age UK clients at a nearby resource centre once a week. He can play the keyboard, guitar and accordion.

Twenty-three-year-old Jacob, a past student at Inscape House School, is translating his long-standing interest in video games into an exciting future career option.

Jacob joined Inscape in 2013, after attending mainstream education and then being home schooled for a year. He stayed on to complete his post-16 education and is now about to start a degree in computer science with cyber security at the University of Salford.

"I'm thankful for the opportunities that Inscape has given me and how it's supported me" says Jacob. "It's a wonderful place ... such a friendly environment for people with autism."





One of the best opportunities – "his lucky shot", as Jacob calls it - was one of Inscape's careers fairs, where Jacob discovered Access Creative College (ACC). He went on to gain a level 3 extended diploma in games development at the college.

As well as studying ICT and other subjects at Inscape, Jacob credits the school and its staff with "just letting me be myself' and gaining "a lot of independence."

Talking about the staff Jacob continued: "Their doors were always open to anyone if you had concerns or anything like feeling anxious."

"We do our very best to ensure that students overcome barriers and surpass expectations" said Hannah Stollar, Inscape's Headteacher. "Staff also help our learners to identify a pathway for their futures. Jacob positively embraced what Inscape has to offer and we're delighted that he's found his professional calling."

Already gaining work experience, as a senior programmer with ACC's Slingshot Studios, Jacob is working towards a professional role in computer science or cyber security. He's looking forward to "unique challenges and new experiences that will help me grow as an individual."

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Fostering spotlight

Not everybody celebrates their special day with the arrival of three children, but that's what happened to our foster carer and 'birthday boy', David Gilder and his wife, Jessica.

Back in March 2022, David enjoyed his birthday cake with pre-teen and teen siblings, two girls and a boy, who were his and Jessica's first foster children, staying for five months.

For most of the time since then, the couple, who are in their 40s, have been caring for three under-10s brothers.

With no children of their own, David and Jessica decided to start fostering to help children who didn't have a "stable home and positive family experiences".



After being approached by approximately 50 organisations initially, the husband-and-wife team eventually chose the Together Trust as the agency they would like to foster with.

"The trust was very responsive during the whole process", said David. "There was always someone you could speak to on the phone. It felt more like a family, and we wanted to be with an organisation reasonably local to us."

Although their fostering experiences have, at times, been "challenging", David and Jessica both see the benefits.

Jessica, who has worked with nursery age children, reflects that the boys living with them have "changed a lot" since they arrived and are "now very settled".

Good ongoing support and training from the Together Trust has helped the couple flourish in their fostering roles.

Friendships have been made with other foster carers and children on the two annual trust-organised short breaks the family have attended. "The boys made good friends and there were tears on the last day" says Jessica.

David's advice about choosing a fostering agency is to 'go with the one you feel most comfortable with", while Jessica adds "go with your heart".

In fact, they've already recommended the Together Trust, giving a big thumbs-up to the sales assistant who helped them with their sofa purchase!





Our volunteers

Our wonderful volunteers have continued to support services and people across the Together Trust. In addition to the time contributed by our trustees and governors, they donated **5,000 hours** to our services and **562 hours to our events**.

Volunteer Driver scheme. This special group transported vulnerable children and young people across our education and residential services on important journeys, including to school, work experience, sports tournaments, educational trips, s well as collecting donations for our fundraising team.
